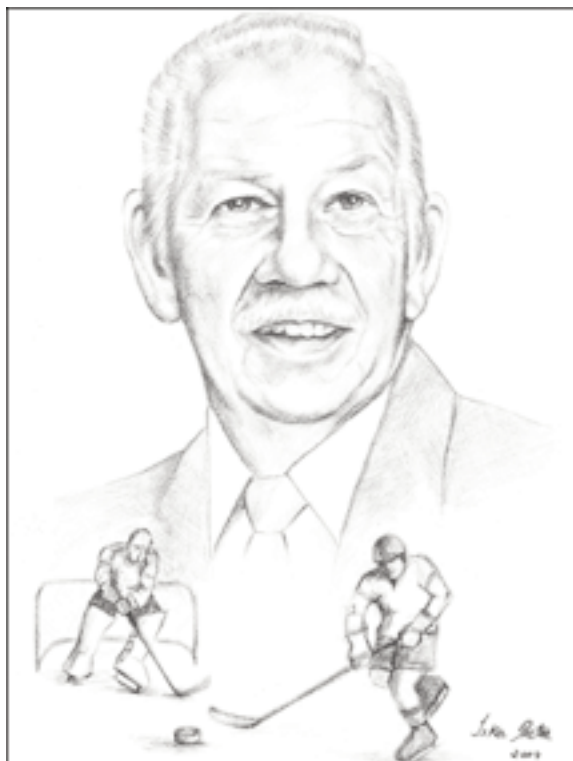

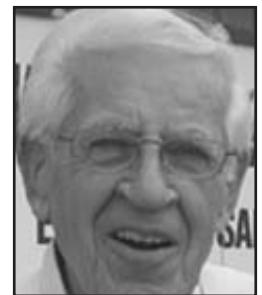

**Sackfield Inducted continued...**of minor hockey in Richmond Hill, Mr. Sackfield, after whom the Ed Sackfield Arena is named, was recognized for his many contributions to the development of sport in the Town. Mr. Sackfield joins other notable inductees such as World Champion figure skater, Elvis Stojko, community leader and sports organization supporter, Elgin Barrow, and the Dynes World Champion Fastball Team.

Ed Sackfield moved to Richmond Hill in 1951, and became an immediate asset to his new community. Joining local community groups and getting involved in Curling and Minor Hockey. Soon after his arrival he became a member of the Lions Club and eventually its Treasurer. During the period from 1951 to 1959 he participated in the formation of the Richmond Hill Arena Association and was a co-founder of the Richmond Hill Curling Club by selling debentures for new facilities, including artificial ice for hockey and figure skating in the old curling club building.

In 1969, Ed served as a Board Member of the Richmond Hill Arena Association and

from 1971 until his retirement in 1990 was the Administrator of the Town's arenas. Sackfield's dedication and commitment to community involvement had a great impact on the development of sports. Particularly Minor Hockey. In 1991, the Ed Sackfield Arena was named in his honour.

Between 1954 and 1990, Ed either coached or managed at nearly every level within the Richmond Hill Minor Hockey Association (RHMHA). He also served as a Director for the RHMHA and was a co-founder and convener of the Richmond Hill House League Tournament and later the Richmond Hill International Pee-Wee Tournament, which donated many thousands of dollars to local causes, including this Sports Hall of Fame.

Ed Sackfield was a founding member of the Richmond Hill Rams Junior 'A' Hockey Club and also served for many years as Richmond Hill's representative with the Ontario Minor Hockey Association (OMHA). In 1989, he was awarded the OMHA's highest award, the prestigious OMHA Honour Award.

Ed served as the Ontario Representative for the Quebec International Pee-Wee Tournament, for more than a decade. During this time, teams that he managed had a winning record on five occasions, **including 1968, the first and only time a "B" team won the Grand Championship.**

The Town of Richmond Hill has been honouring athletes and builders, among others, for ages. Whose sports achievements have had a lasting effect on the community. The Richmond Hill Sports Hall of Fame was first established in 1997 in the former Council Chambers at Old Town Hall, but was open to the public only during special events. By 2005, however, the list of inductees had grown to more than 20 and a

new location was needed to show off the growing collection. It officially opened at its current location in the Tom Graham Arena on April 23, 2005 and is now open to the public, daily. To date, the Hall boasts 30 inductees, representing more than 25 sports.... **Congratulations Ed!!!! A worthy recipient no less!! On a very memorable occasion!!**

**47 years serving the 30,000 citizens of Fort Erie, come to and end....**

Emile McIlvenna's 47 years with the Town of Fort Erie that began as a part timer July 5th 1964 came to end July 10th 2005. His final day on the job as Director of Parks & Leisure Services for the past 26 years. He officially retired August 31st 2005. The Prez cannot recall any member of the Alumni spending 47 years with one employer.. a record no less, that can be attributed to Emile's "**passion for the job**"...

The Ottawa native, came from a family of four siblings (2 boys & 2 gals) raised by his parents Delvia & Frank. His father was a "tool & die maker". Emile was five years old when the family moved to Mallory Town, five years later they settled in Fort Erie. Frank found employment in Buffalo.

Emile continued his schooling in Fort Erie. While attending secondary school he pursued part time employment at the Fort Erie Arena. His resume already included several years as a "rink rat", that began in 1959, under the watchful eye of Fort Erie Arena Manager Ebbie Bishop.

Bishop accepted an offer to manage the Memorial Gardens in Guelph, and was succeeded by Jim Fraser. Don Fulton took over as Director in 1962, and hired Emile as bookkeeper. July 5th 1964 marked the beginning of full time employment. Emile was awarded the Assistant Arena Manager's position in 1967. McIlvenna's

achieved his next goal, "*obtaining an Arena Manager's certificate*". Enrolling in the Arena Management program, offered by the OAA at the University of Guelph.

Two new arenas opened in 1974 and 1975. Years later the municipality sold a large parcel of land which included the old Fort Erie Arena, that would pave the way for the construction of a multi million dollar recreation facility, on a 21 acre site. Leisureplex opened in 1996. The 125,000 square foot, multi-purpose facility houses two year round ice surfaces and a 7,000 square foot banquet hall, incorporating the latest in technology and amenities. And much more....



The municipality made a number of organizational changes in 1979, following the departure of Fulton, who chose to pursue a career in the private sector. Emile was promoted to the newly created position of Director of Recreation.

April '79. His new portfolio went beyond arenas. Parks and the eventual inclusion of Cemeteries became part of his expanded role. His title was changed to Director of Parks & Leisure Services. At the time of retirement, Emile had spent 26 years as a Director.

Long time friend and associate Brian Desrosiers secured employment in 1980. Eventually replacing Emile, following another "method of operating change".

Emile notes a number of career hi lites...Project Manager overseeing the design and construction of facilities....Lions Sugar Bowl Park in 1992....construction of the Municipality's Leisureplex in 1995 and '96.... Plus numerous Waterfront parks...

Retirement allows Emile to spend more time with his wife Lynn and their fourteen year old son Daniel, and his many minor sports activities. *Summers and boating are very special times..* They always look forward to boating... journeying to various locations...that always end with a cocktail or two...Emile and his bride Lynn were married in 2003....she currently oversees a major renovation to their Rose Avenue home...the project entails a complete make over of their kitchen...new appliances, hard wood floors...and more...**a short time inconvenience for a long term gain**...Enjoy retirement to its fullest .....

#### **40 year employee, Daryl Fowler retires**

Several things came out loud and clear, during Fowler's retirement soirée, that the "**quiet one**" was a very dedicated, proud and effective contributor.

Mentor Ken Fagel admittedly was responsible for launching Fowler's municipal career in 1967, at the newly constructed Centennial Arena. Daryl's prime function was to move the hockey nets, "**while the ice was being flooded**". His reward for performing this service, "*help himself to whatever he wanted*" out of the concession booth". Admitting that he worked for hot dogs. It was acceptable common practice in those days to recruit "**rink rats**" to assist with ice reconditioning.

The sixteen year old fulfilled his first dream. When he moved on to Memorial Gardens, working for Russ McGinnis and later under the guidance and direction of Barry Milner. As a member of the Garden's crew... one of his primary duties "**reconditioning the ice**"..Since this function was done by hand, Daryl stood to make "**twenty five cents for each ice scraping**" and or "**fifty cents for pulling the flooding cart**". Garden's Manager Len Gaudette admitted that if they would pay these guys a little more, perhaps

they could do some cleaning around the facility. During the spring/summer months, Daryl would repair roller skates and patrol the moon light skating program. He met his future bride Donna, while roller skating. Fowler claimed he was pretty light on his feet back then.*Barry Milner was anointed manager of the newly opened Exhibition Arena in 1972, and reached out to Daryl to come to Exhibition. Ice reconditioning was done by hand. Back to shovels and flood carts. Compensation for performing these duties ballooned to "fifty cents and one dollar for each flood". The ice crew spent their time between floods, playing poker in the back room. Fowler vividly remembers those days, when they were handed the little brown pay envelope with cash*".

*The leap from "rink rat" status in 1967 to part time duties, moving hockey nets at Memorial Gardens, and being **paid three dollars an hour**. A mighty huge financial jump in wages. Daryl continued to stay the course that eventually led to a full time entry level position at Memorial Gardens. He was successful in securing a Refrigeration Operator's "B" Certificate designation. Awarded a facility operator's opening in 1971. The City at the time, had just amalgamated Parks, Recreation and Arenas into a single entity.*

Victoria Road Complex opened in 1975. Daryl and fellow co-worker Geoff Gilmour landed the job of commissioning the building, from the contractors. Fowler was appointed "Arena Foreman" in 1980 overseeing both Exhibition and Centennial Arenas. Nine years later he became a Class 22 Foreman. Elevated to Supervisor of Memorial Gardens in 1991. Daryl continued to move thro the system. Selected to fill the role of Manager Victoria Roads Recreation Centre and Arenas in 2003. Chosen to fill the role of Facility Manager. Overseeing multiple facilities that



included Victoria Road Complex, Exhibition Arena, Centennial Arena, Centennial Pool and Lyon out door Pool. Retaining that position until retirement.

During his career he came in contact with and or worked under some of Guelph's facility legends, Jack Sumner, Ebbie Bishop, Len Gaudett, Terry Powell, Lawrence Murphy, Ken Fagel and Barry Milner. Daryl was a proud, dedicated, committed city staffer, who worked relentlessly to fill the needs of facility groups. He worked thro the City's first ever work stoppage in the winter 2006... maintaining facilities.

Eighty years of facility experience was about to end. His very close associate Geoff Gilmour also retired the same day. *"We opened Victoria Road Recreation Centre together and we left 34 years latter together"*. Guelph's Sports Hall of Fame located in the Sleeman Centre is one of Daryl's several initiatives and pet project. He is looking forward to sustain his contribution and nurture its growth during retirement.

In 1970 Donna (Paylor) got Daryl's attention during one of her many "after hour" moon

light roller skating sessions. It seems that Donna had some trouble skating backwards, until Daryl came along. They exchanged wedding vows at Chalmers United Church in Guelph on June 28th 1975. Raised two siblings Stephanie and Cory. Both have unrelated jobs to mom and dad.

Donna was working as a cashier at Zehr's Food Markets, when they met. She elected to join Daryl in retirement, ending 37 years with Zehr's. Her retirement kicked in June 26th 2009. The Fowler's will enjoy the summer, relaxing with friends and neighbors at their cottage on Belwood Lake. Get out for the odd golf game together. ***Estimating it will take two years to complete their extensive "to do" list....***while enjoying gardening.... leaving plenty of time to decide what will happen during the winter months...

***July 5th 1976 marked the beginning of Jane's full time entry into the municipal recreation world.***

*Spending her entire career with the City of Brantford. Thirty two years and six months later her career came to end... Very early in life, Galt YWCA were seeking students to fill their summer staffing needs. They were impressed with the interview and offered Jane Querin employment as a "Leader in Training". They sensed that Jane possessed an abundance of leadership skills. And with additional coaching would be a good team player. She went on to be a "Day Camp Counselor". The "Y" experience set the stage to enroll and successfully complete the Recreation Leadership program offered by Conestoga College.*

*The Galt/Cambridge resident armed with her "Recreation Leadership Diploma", pursued a "Community Centre Supervisor" opening, with Brantford Parks & Recreation Department and after a few years at the*



Centre, she moved to Community Development in 1978. She faced each opportunity in life, with dedication, enthusiasm, and respect for her peers and community volunteers. Adhering to the principle, that

life was forever a **“learning curve”**.

In 1982 Jane was given another challenge when she became the Marketing Coordinator for Parks and Recreation, eventually having Special Events added to the title. She worked with local volunteer groups, to assist with various special events.

Another wonderful opportunity came her way in 1997. She became Assistant Manager, Brantford & District Civic Centre, where her marketing and event skills became important.

January 1st 2005, Jane was elevated to Manage the Centre, her final role, before electing to retire January 31st 2009. Bringing to an end, a rewarding career, filled with so many highlights. Citing the opportunity to work along side a very dedicated Parks & Recreation team. Seeing the benefits of recreation, raising the quality of life in the community. The passionate role of volunteers. Witnessing a National Championship and much more...

Jane found time to volunteer. She left her foot prints in her beloved community of Brantford and well beyond its boundaries. She served as a canvasser for the Brant United Way for many years and eventually took on the role of Chair of the Campaign in 1997. She is the Past President of the Brant County Chapter, Heart & Stroke

Foundation. And she found time to serve on committees over seeing Participation House, Crime Stoppers and participated in an all women build with Habitat for Humanity. She also held a number of executive positions, and the President's gavel, with the Recreation Association of West Central Ontario. Her endless years of professional contributions to the Association, were acknowledged with a Life Membership.

Beckoned by the call from her peers at the provincial level in late 80's. She served on the executive of the Ontario Recreation Society and eventually took on the enormous task of chairing the Society's 1991 Annual Convention in Hamilton.

Marriage didn't seem possible, during her hectic career, That all changed in 1993, when she met University of Guelph graduate, Ed Curtis during a work out at the Brantford “Y”. The seven year romance led to marriage at St. Pius Church, in Brantford, on October 7th 2000.

Ed recently completed the Professional Accounting program and secured employment with Industry Canada. Community volunteering has also been on Ed's agenda, most recently with Brant United Way Agency.

Ed's love of recreation has been shared with many friends and neighbours on the backyard ice rink he builds, known as the ECC, “Ed Curtis Centre”. Complete with lights for night time hockey and skating. Jane, a former hockey player enjoys the fruits of Ed's labour. They have similar hobbies. That include golf, gardening and time at the family cottage. Capped off with watching sports of all kinds, but especially hockey where they cheer for opposing teams, **Jane for the Leafs and Ed for the Habs.....**

A host of loyal friends, customers, suppliers and family, attended the 30th Anniversary of Jet Ice, June 5th 2009, at their Newmarket location. Welcomed by the “bubbly” Company President Debbie Wilcock and her dedicated staff. The Prez and Michelle were thrilled to attend. 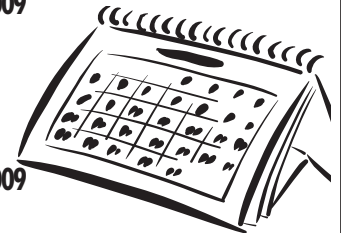
